Literacy is...

the ability to use language and images in rich and varied forms to read, write, listen, speak, view, represent, and think critically about ideas. It enables us to share information, to interact with others, and to make meaning. Literacy is a complex process that involves building on prior knowledge, culture, and experiences in order to develop new knowledge and deeper understanding.

This expanded view of literacy...

- is already affirmed in FSL curriculums in all Canadian provinces and territories.
- recognizes the changes in media and information technologies, and the multiliterate nature of our students today.

What is a multiliterate learner?

- Multiliterate learners, often literate in a home language, use linguistic and cultural diversity as a source of strength.
- Multiliterate learners have multimodal ways of making meaning from text (for example, using visual, audio, spatial, and electronic means).
