## **Welcome to Mexico!**




Hola! Welcome to Mexico!

Along the **coast**, the mighty **ocean** roars.





In the mountain forests, a bear family searches for food.

Many animals call Mexico home. Have you ever seen a puma? You might see one in







Coyotes also live there. You might hear a coyote howling at the moon.

Mexico City is the capital of Mexico. You can find museums, universities, and tall office buildings in the city.


