

TWO MÉTIS STRUCTURES

The Métis People are one of three Indigenous Peoples who live in Canada. The other two are First Nations and Inuit. Métis People have their own distinct traditions, languages, and culture.

Red River Cart

The Red River cart helped Métis People hunt buffalo. It was **constructed** to bring back meat and furs from buffalo hunts. Only wood was used in the **construction** of a Red River cart. It was pulled by a horse or an ox. The cart would squeak loudly as the two large wheels turned.

Sometimes, Métis People had to cross a river. They **deconstructed** the cart by taking off the wheels. This turned the cart into a raft, so it could float across the river. After crossing the river, Métis People **reconstructed** the cart—they put the wheels back on.

Red River carts created trails. These trails became trail systems many people used for travel. When travelling, Métis People could use the cart to get out of rain, snow, or sun. The Red River cart was a very useful **structure**!

Trapper's Tent

Trapper's tents were used by Métis trappers in the past. Métis trappers still use the tents today. Trappers set a line of traps in the bush. They use trapper's tents along these trap lines. The tents are **structures** that protect trappers from wind, rain, and snow. Trapper's tents are also used for camping.

A trapper's tent is made of wood and canvas. It is easy to move from place to place. It is also easy to **deconstruct** and fold up. A horse can carry the tent to the next place.

Red River carts and trapper's tents are inventions that Métis People are still proud of today.

Connections

- Look at the word **deconstruct**. Notice the prefix *de-* (meaning “the opposite of”) added to the beginning of the word **construct**. **Deconstruct** means “to take apart,” the opposite of **construct**.
- Look at the word **reconstruct**. Notice the prefix *re-* (meaning “again”) added to the beginning of the word **construct**. The word **reconstruct** means “to build again.”
